

How Much MONEY Do You SAVE At Your Library?

The New Rochelle Public Library helps tens of thousands of people each year in countless immeasurable ways. The contribution of public libraries to society can't be represented in dollars and cents.

But, calculating how much money you save by using the library can be an eye-opening experience. We asked a few patrons of the New Rochelle Public Library to use a simple calculator tool (first created by the Maine State Library) to estimate how much money they would have spent out-of-pocket for library services in 2009.

What is your library worth to you? Use the calculator on our website (www.nrpl.org) to find out how much you would have paid each month for your library services.

You are bound to be impressed!

Here's what they saved and told us about their savings:



Margaret Chadwick saved \$5,845. "I could never afford to read the way I do if I didn't have this wonderful library – and library system. NRPL's customer service is excellent. And, if I can't find the book I want here, it is easily borrowed for me from another library."



Rick Donahue saved \$1,896. "Easily! As a teacher and scientist I am always reading current books. I go on-line to commercial sites to find out what new books will be released, then put a hold on them using my New Rochelle library card."



Denise Haynes saved \$2,892. "I attend many library programs – New Rochelle has the widest assortment of concerts, films, classes – and yoga! If I'm not borrowing a book to read I'm buying one from the Friends' carts, bookstore or book sale-- and saving a bundle."



Message from the **Director**

Dear Patrons,

On May 18th, residents will be given an opportunity to vote on the 2010/11 Library budget, and its three million dollar bond infrastructure as well as filling the Board of Library Trustee vacancy.

Our proposed budget will see an increase of 4.73% in the tax levy for New Rochelle residents. This translates to increase of \$184,971 in the overall Library budget, or an increase of \$22 per household for the "average" taxpayer (estimate furnished by the New Rochelle City Finance Department.)

Understanding the economic realities of our citizenry, Library Board of Trustees and library administration took unusual measures to limit tax levy by eliminating seven staff positions since 2005 and reducing the materials budget by 3%.

Yet, the Library continues its excellent service to the community and has seen an unprecedented rise in its use (over 21% in the last year.) The Board, representing a cross-section of the community, recognizes that library services are even more critical in these difficult financial times.

To that end, voters are asked to consider a bond referendum of three million dollars, to be paid over twenty years at a fixed interest rate. The bond will allow for the repair and reconstruction of building components that have exceeded life expectancy and would not be in compliance with current municipal code.

The infrastructure projects are imperative to the continued safe and efficient functioning of the library. The building has served New Rochelle well, but is now in dire need of this attention. The longer the work is delayed, the more expensive – and critical- the situation becomes. The "road map" provided by a Conditions Assessment provided by the engineering firm of Wank Adams Slavin Associates LLP (WASA) will allow for the work in a cost-effective, phased approach and without undue disruption to library operations.

After months of research and deliberations, the Board has identified a bond to be the most cost-effective, least expensive means to cover the expense of these critically-needed projects, with the least impact on the New Rochelle taxpayer. Historically low rate interests rates will translate to the lowest debt service possible, paid over a twenty year period. Additionally, construction costs for our proposed projects seem likely to remain low given the economic downturn and the subsequent relative lack of work opportunities.

The following statistics illustrates the extraordinary activity of your library:

- Circulation loans are 3th highest in Westchester County
- Reference questions answered are 2nd highest in Westchester County
- Patron visits are 4th highest in Westchester County
- Program events are 3th highest in Westchester County

Despite our success, our tax support is modest:

- Local public support per capita is 6th lowest in Westchester County
- Local public library materials support per capita is 3rd lowest in Westchester County

I urge you to participate in the Library Budget/Bond/Trustee Vote on Tuesday, May 18th between the hours of 7 am and 9 pm at Board of Education polling sites throughout New Rochelle.

Adult Fiction: *Diamond Ruby* by Joseph E. Wallace

A love of Brooklyn and baseball shines through Wallace's engrossing novel, to be published **May 4**. When teenaged Ruby loses most of her family to the 1918 flu epidemic, she is left to care for her two young nieces. Using the only tools she has—unnaturally long arms and an uncanny ability to throw accurately—she gets a job throwing a baseball in a Coney Island sideshow. After all, any self-respecting young man can out throw Diamond Ruby—can't he? The appealing Ruby is gritty and resourceful and you'll want to follow her adventures as she deals with rapacious showmen and shifty gangsters, meets the great Babe Ruth and is befriended by Jack Dempsey. With wonderful old-time Brooklyn atmosphere, fascinating baseball lore and compelling storytelling, this is a novel to be savored.

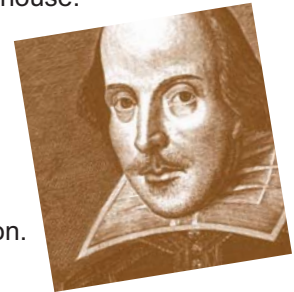
SHAKESPEARE FILM FESTIVAL
