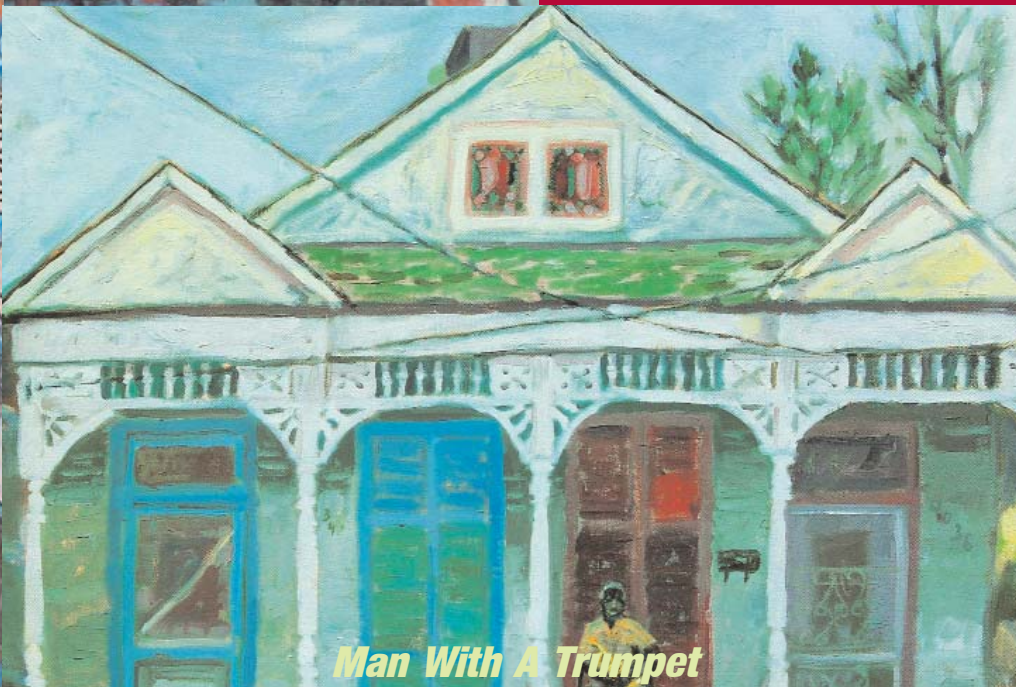

## Partnership for the Huguenot Children's Library - enters its second decade!

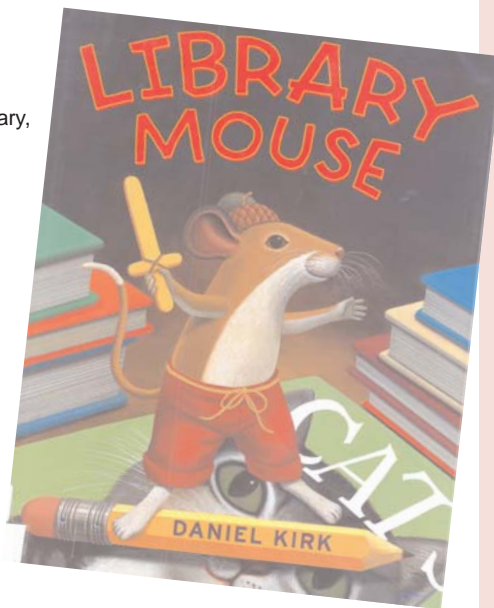

## Thank You!

The library is pleased to announce that Cappelli Enterprises has donated \$5,000 to NRPL for the purposes of continuing the improvement of the library building's exterior and lobby. This substantial gift will be used for selective cleaning of the tile facade and windows and aluminum cladding adjacent to entrances-all to help make the library more appealing to our patrons and visitors to downtown New Rochelle.

A grant in the amount of \$2,650 was awarded to the library for a 15-week project, Family Trees - Visual Memories. The grant is part of Creative Aging in Our Communities: The Westchester Libraries Project, which is generously funded by the Helen Andrus Benedict Foundation as part of their effort to build elder-friendly communities. ## New & Improved Library Service



A wonderful tool to help visually impaired patrons read and write is now located near the microfilm readers on the second floors. Thanks to the generosity of Gary Rikoon, who made the donation in memory of his mother, Helen Rikoon, the library is now able to offer the use of a high-tech, easy-to-use electronic magnifier. With one button simplicity, patrons can have a book, magazine, letter or other piece of printed material magnified onto an attached screen that provides crisp and clear images with vivid colors. The images can be moved, decreasing and increasing the magnification, color, and density to suit the needs of the user.

The magnifier is also a good way for anyone to get a closer look at a printed piece or photograph. Library staff members recently used it to read the tiny, blurred print on an archival photograph, which enabled them to correctly identify its location.

## Focus on African-American Film Thursdays at 7:00 pm Ossie Davis Theater Free

### Thursday, February 5 *Love Jones* (1997)

Directed by Theodore Witcher; Starring Larenz Tate, Nia Long, Isaiah Washington, Lisa Nicole Carson, Bill Bellamy. This romantic story of young upwardly mobile African-Americans has become a classic date movie. After an immediate infatuation blossoms between a once-bitten Chicagoan woman (Long) and a slick spoken-word artist (Tate), they have to find a way to maintain their relationship.

### Thursday, February 19 *Wattstax* (1973)

Directed by Mel Stuart; Featuring appearances by Richard Pryor, Rev. Jesse Jackson, Isaac Hayes, the Staple Singers, Luther Ingram, Carla Thomas, Rufus Thomas, and many others. Staged at the Los Angeles Coliseum on August 20th, 1972, the Watts Summer Festival concert was an incredible outpouring of music and soul that brought together over 100,000 people in a spirit of joy, pride, and celebration. An electric, enlightening, and unforgettable cultural time capsule, WATTSTAX captures not only the sound and sentiment of a community, but depicts a rare panorama of 1970s Los Angeles.

Directed by Hal Ashby; Starring Beau Bridges, Diana Sands, Pearl Bailey, Louis Gossett, Jr., Lee Grant. Spoiled white rich kid Elgar Enders (Beau Bridges) buys himself an inner-city tenement, planning to evict all the occupants and construct a luxury home for himself. Once he moves in, however, he gradually grows fond of the low-income black residents who live there. Based on the novel by Kristin Hunter.

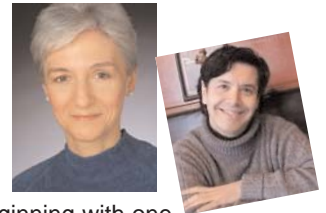

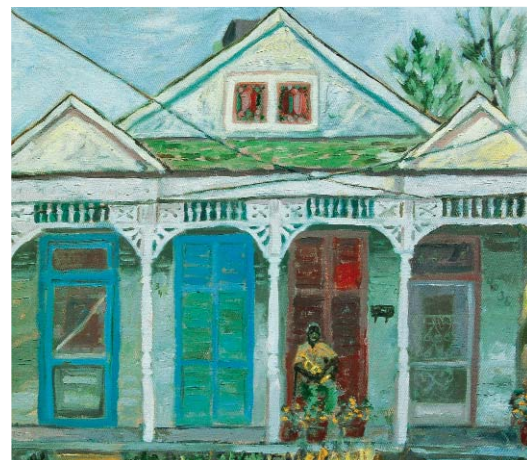

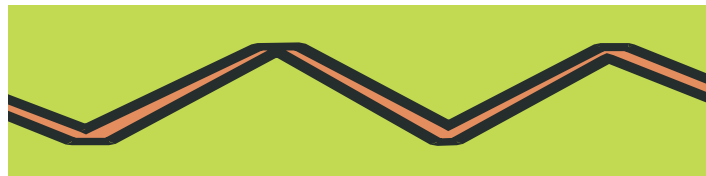
