NRPL Receives Major Grant Award

We are delighted to announce that the New Rochelle Public Library has been awarded funding to become a New York Public Computer Center *broadbandexpress@yourlibrary*, and will be receiving \$244,000 over the next two years. NRPL is the only library in Westchester County to receive this award.

The Library Lobby Receives a Face-lift

A fresh coat of paint, snazzy new carpeting, brighter lights and more space – all part of the seemingly magical transformation that has given new life to the library's formerly worn and tired lobby and the meeting room. The rejuvenation that took place in August was made possible by the generosity of the New Rochelle Public Library Foundation, which raised funds for the design and implementation of this much-needed project. We are all thrilled with the results!

Another Great Summer

The main library and the Huguenot Children's Library were hopping this summer. In total, over 5,500 children, teens and adults enjoyed over 220 free programs between July 6th and August 20th! From colorful music and dance from all parts of the world to thought-provoking book discussions; exuberant sessions of "bouncing babies" to energetic dance lessons for teens; magic and comedy live on stage to the magic of comedy on the screen, NRPL had something for everyone. We couldn't have done it without the generous support of the Friends of the Library, the Partnership for the Huguenot Children's Library and the New Rochelle Public Library Foundation. It was also a banner year for reading by children - 780 young people joined the library's summer reading game, and read over 8,000 books.

New Rochelle Public Library Awarded Federal Stimulus Funds

The New Rochelle Public Library has announced that it is one of 35 libraries in New York State to receive funding to become a New York Public Computer Center broadbandexpress@yourlibrary, and will be receiving \$244,000 over the next two years. This grant is made possible by the New York State Library, a unit of the Office of Cultural Education within the New York State Education Department (NYSED), which was awarded \$9.5 million in a grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) to expand computer access in public libraries across New York State. The funding is being provided through the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act (ARRA) Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP). The federal stimulus funding of \$9,521,150 and \$5,418,370 in matching funds will be used to create a 30 public access computer centers in public libraries and 5 E-mobile computer training units.



NRPL will use the funding to create a "BTOP Help Center" on the second floor of the library, with professional staff to assist with job searches, filing e-forms and accessing social services, and utilizing technology to connect with needed resources. Additional computer stations and trained computer instructors and assistants will allow for expanded training and one-on-one guidance. Classes in improving job opportunities, starting a business and other employment-related support will be also offered on a regular basis.

"This is a tremendous opportunity for the library and the New Rochelle community," said Greg Varian, president of the library's Board of Trustees. "The library has a long tradition of providing a wide array of essential resources to our citizens. This funding will expand those resources and it will increase the level of services our staff can provide to residents having the greatest needs." NRPL's Public Computer Center will be fully operational by this December.

Thanks to the generosity of the New Rochelle Public Library Foundation, you will find a newly rejuvenated Library Lobby upon entering our Main Library facility!

We are now sporting new flooring, paint and lighting in our newly enlarged lobby/gallery spaces as well as a similar "facelift" in our popular meeting room adjacent to the Ossie Davis Theater. Feedback from patrons and staff has been overwhelmingly positive about this drab to pleasing transformation.

Another improvement is the newly reconfigured Friends of New Rochelle Public Library lobby book sale effort. Located in a series of attractive bookcases adjacent to the Lumen Winter Gallery, this eclectic assortment of affordable books will continue to impress booklovers of all ages.

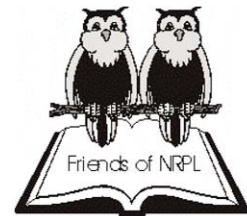

Q: What do you do at the library?

A: As a librarian working in Adult Services, I answer patrons' questions, I locate books and movies and music for them. I run a book club called The Liberty Book Club that deals with books on American History, a passion of mine. I also set up the schedules for all the librarians so they know where they are supposed to be.

Q: Your favorite thing at the New Rochelle Public Library?

A: My fellow co-workers. That's an honest answer.

Q: Besides working here, what was your favorite job?

A: Working at Barnes & Nobles selling books - very much like working in a library.

Q: Where did you grow up?

A: In the South Bronx, in a large family, I'm the fifth child. As you can imagine, there was always a lot going on.

Q: Any hobbies or special interests?

A: Comic books! I've been collecting comic books since I was 10 years old. Lots of friends collected and to fit in with them, I started. But when they fell off, I continued, and at 36, I still collect them. I have over 3,000 comic books and my most valuable is the first appearance of Wolverine. It's in medium condition and worth about 400 to 500 dollars. In mint condition it would be worth 20 grand!

Q: If you were a comic book character, who might you be?

A: I would be Batman. I admire the character for his determination to fight for people who are victims of crime. I like that he is a man, not a superman, and has achieved his greatness by training his mind and body to be near perfection - and he looks cool.

Q: Name something on your bucket list you have accomplished.

A: Getting that Wolverine comic, getting married, having children, going to England, not necessarily in that order.

Q: Name one or two things still on your list.

A: I'd like to go to Ireland, write a book, see a lot of famous sites throughout the U.S. like Mount Vernon in Virginia, Mount Rushmore, and so on - because I like American history.

Q: Describe yourself in a few words:

A: Family man, passionate, honest, loving, and thoughtful.

Q: Dream vacation?

A: Taking my sons to every single baseball park in the United States.

Q: Who would you invite to a fantasy dinner party?

A: George Washington and Abraham Lincoln, Shakespeare, Keith Hernandez, Stan Lee (he created Spiderman, the X-Men, and the Hulk) and Bill Finger who was the true creative force behind the Batman stories.

Q: People would be surprised to know that you?

A: I like soap operas. I got hooked in high school when I realized there was a pretty girl on one of the shows. I don't watch much now but I used to watch Days of Our Lives and General Hospital.

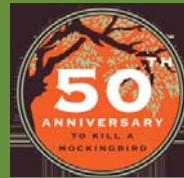

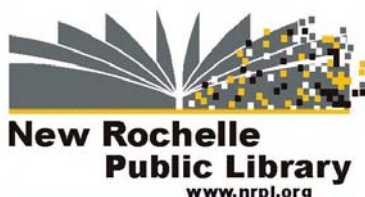
