ABOUT THE TALK: Humans have long sought a "fountain of youth", some way to slow, stop, or reverse the aging process. In this inaugural New Rochelle Science Café discussion, Dr. Rosenberg explores the current scientific understanding of the human aging process, discusses current research areas for extending lifespan, and reveals what we can do to modify the process right now.

ABOUT DR. ROSENBERG: Warren Rosenberg, Ph.D., currently serves as Iona's Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs and is responsible for providing leadership, budget and supervisory oversight of two academic units (Hagan School of Business; School of Arts & Science), academic support services (library, learning center), information technology (academic and administrative computing), student development (residential life, health services, counseling, career services, campus safety and security), campus ministries, and enrollment management (admissions, financial aid, registrar, retention). He formerly served for seven years as Dean of the School of Arts & Science and, prior to that, as Chair of the Department of Biology. He earned his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in Biology at New York University and his undergraduate degree in Biology from the City University of New York. Dr. Rosenberg currently teaches courses in Science Literacy, Exercise Science, Nutrition, and the Biology of Aging. He has authored a recent book, "Exercise Science" © 2001, 2008 (2nd Edition) and has coauthored "Integrated Science" © 2004, 2007 (2nd Edition) with his colleagues Dr. Louis Campisi and Dr. Victor Stanionis.
