Librarians Recommend

Adult Fiction: Revisit some Old Favorites

If you enjoy reading historical fiction, you might want to take a look at some of the "golden oldies" that are being reissued in colorful trade paper editions by a variety of publishers. Two of English author Margaret Campbell Barnes' titles have recently been released: *My Lady of Cleves* and *Brief Gaudy Hour*, a novel of Anne Boleyn. Hopefully more titles will follow. The novels of Jean Plaidy, who wrote about many English monarchs, have also been re-released over the past few years; they combine strong historical background with stirring romance. A final author to be aware of is Anya Seton. Notable among her titles are *The Winthrop Woman*, *My Theodosia* (Aaron Burr's daughter), and *Katharine*. This last title, the story of 14th century Katherine Swynford and her blazing love affair with John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, has been a favorite of many since its 1954 publication and well deserves to be rediscovered. Interestingly enough, noted biographer Alison Weir has just published *Mistress of the Monarchy*, a factual retelling of Katherine's story that presents her as an unusual and compelling woman.

Young Adult Fiction: The Graveyard Book by Neil Gaiman

Gaiman's playful and creepy riff on Kipling's *Jungle Book* stories follows the life of Nobody Owens, sole survivor of his family's murder and adopted son of the ghostly residents of a nearby graveyard. Bod, as he is called, must learn to navigate not only the world of the dead, but the far more sinister land of the living as he grows from baby to young man in this snappy and glittering series of episodic stories. Highly recommended! (ages 10 & up) Note: *The Graveyard Book* was recently awarded the 2009 John Newberry award, the most distinguished award for children's literature in the U.S.

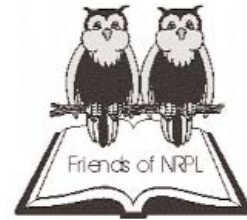


A New Library Resource

Journal News Database

The Current and past issues of *The Journal News* are now available online from your home computer and at the library. With an easy click and the barcode on the back of your New Rochelle Public Library card, you can search for information by subject, title, and by date from 1999 till present. Here's how: From the NRPL home page (www.nrpl.org), click on the "reference" tab and you'll be directed to the link for *Journal News*.

If you using your home computer, type in the barcode on the back of your library card. Then follow the easy directions to search for the information you need from the *Journal News*. This News Bank Info site also provides electronic editions of a variety of American news magazines and local, regional, and national U.S. newspapers--all in the same easy-to-search database and without advertisements. A: What's not to like! It's a great social blast, a little village where something is always happening. I'm also crazy about babies and children. I also love the staff.
